June 13 - 14 as well as August 22 - 23. On these specific dates you still MUST have a permit but your fee is **WAIVED!**



In the Works - Turnpike Flooding Prevention

Though many areas of Crestwood experienced a flooding deluge after the brutally harsh winter, some good news just recently surfaced.

Illinois House Bill 1551, a Metropolitan Water Reclamation District Stormwater Bill, was included in House Bill 3912, which just passed the Senate. This critical bill was holding up the MWRD's plans to hold authority on local projects, specifically Crestwood's effort to put together the plan for the basin at Midlothian Turnpike. Though this will not solve all flooding issues, the MWRD intends to work further on Tinley Creek, which is just four blocks downstream in Midlothian, to further improve drainage. State Representative Bob Rita co-sponsored HB 3912. Crestwood Mayor Lou Presta, Crestwood Trustee Patricia Flynn and Mayor Mary Werner of Worth provided witness support.

We will continue to keep you updated on the MWRD timeline as we work with our engineers.

Letter from Mayor Lou Presta

This month we remember and pay tribute to the most important men in our lives, our fathers. Fatherhood comes jam-packed with responsibility but there are no greater rewards to be had than the pleasure of watching your children grow and find their way. I hope that every dad in our Village gets to enjoy a great Father's Day this year.

I am happy to see residents once again taking pleasure and pride in our Village as they witness firsthand how it is growing and how new jobs are being brought to Crestwood. We continue to make headway with the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District (MWRD) on the Rt. 83 Corridor and we are also working hard to obtain financing to help us undertake major flood prevention projects throughout the Village. We have asked MWRD to assume funding for the replacement of footbridges in the Playfield area and continue to explore other government grants and financing strategies.

We had to tighten our belts this year because of expenses we were forced to undertake with accountants, lawyers and TIF experts. All this was necessary in order to plan long-term financial strategies that assure our Village remains strong financially well into the future. Trustees Pieroth and Flynn accompanied me to Springfield to meet with representatives from both the House and Senate to gain support for an extension to our existing TIF district. We received endorsements from 9 out of 10 taxing bodies and we are still in talks with School District 130 to craft an agreement that will be a win/win for all. Senator Emil Jones III, State Representative Bob Rita, Cook County Commissioner Joan Murphy and U.S. Representative Bobby Rush have all given their support to our endeavors and the hard work by our Board to do what is for the best for our Village and not what is simply politically expedient.

Our Board and I just finished crafting a proposed budget and our expenses have risen. Our switch to Advanced Life Support (ALS) service, now used by our Fire Department has already saved lives and makes every resident safer today. We never anticipated that the ALS service would be a revenue maker, but the service is about saving lives, not money. With ALS service comes the need to be compliant with State and Federal regulations as well as the purchase of new equipment, training and staffing.

I am sure you have seen our work progressing on the Walker Park Concessions and we are currently in talks about a new sports dome that will cover Caesar Park, accommodating a multitude of sporting events all year round. We are also in talks with developers proposing an upscale hotel along Cicero Avenue. Your Recreation Commission has obtained playground equipment for Caesar

Park, which will soon be installed. Your Board also recently approved a new Jumbotron scoreboard for our stadium. Several local businesses have agreed to sponsor the sign. Your Recreation Commission is also exploring sponsoring additional movies in the park, at the stadium.

We added more full-time police officers and fitted their cars with cameras/video to protect both you and our officers. We now have more transparency in crime reporting through use of a blotter in our Crestwood Adviser. We will receive \$800,000 in grant money from the Southwest Conference of Mayors that will help us improve our sidewalks along Midlothian Turnpike.

Improving Government

Your Crestwood Village Board is working hard to ensure checks, balances, and transparency so than every citizen can see what is happening in their hometown. The Illinois Policy Institute has authored a 10-point Transparency Checklist that each municipality can use to measure their level of commitment to transparency and improve policies and procedures. The Illinois Policy Institute's checklist lists the following categories: contact information, public meeting postings, public information, budgets, audits, expenditures, compensation, contracts, lobbying and taxes. Your Mayor and Board are determined to not only meet every level on the policy checklist but to exceed their list in delivering a village government that is relevant, understandable and fully accessible to every citizen.

When it comes to spending your hard earned tax dollars, the Mayor and Board places multiple sets of eyes on each transactions to ensure proper accounting measures are taken and consistent. Besides board members, the Clerk, and

various staff members, the Village also retains a comptroller and treasurer that examine each transaction. On top of all those checks, the Village also conducts an annual audit by an outside firm to ensure that every procedure was correctly followed and every penny properly accounted.

A new ethics ordinance was recently introduced at a Village Board Meeting and reviewed with full Board and Mayoral support. Ethics ordinance are not a new notion and the Mayor and several board members frequently network with other town officials sharing new ideas that will help here in Crestwood. The Village of Oak Lawn Board of Trustees recently adopted an ethics ordinance and the Village of Crestwood is using that ordinance to build upon. Fiduciary responsibility, improper influence, unauthorized usage of Village-owned property, disclosure of confidential information and conflicts of interest or the appearance of impropriety are just a few of the key points we have included in this new ordinance and are currently under consideration. Final amendments of the ordinance are being considered and the first ever Crestwood Ethics Ordinance should come to a vote this month.

Attention Crestwood Business Owners

Door-to-door Solicitations by Energy Suppliers

Recently, it was brought to the attention of Trustee Flynn regarding the relentless calls from energy suppliers that gave the impression to residents that were in fact part of and/or representing ComEd. After contacting our local liaison, ComEd External Affairs Manager Bonita Parker, the following information was provided.

Q. What should customers do if they're being targeted by third party energy providers who are using unwanted and aggressive recruitment tactics?

A. Retail Electric Suppliers* (known as RES's or suppliers) and/or Agents, Brokers and Consultants* (known as ABCs) may use aggressive marketing techniques to attract new business. Customers are being solicited to new electric suppliers through traditional means and now through door-to-door sales and telemarketing. These suppliers and ABCs must be certified by the ICC, which is the governing agency with oversight of these entities. ComEd is not actively soliciting its customers to switch their electric supplier and fully supports a customer's right to choose an alternative supplier.

If a resident is the subject of unwanted and aggressive recruitment tactics, they should inform the municipality and then contact the ICC Consumer Services Division (CSD) at 1-800-524-0795. Also, the resident can share his or her concerns with Illinois Commerce Commission via the Office of Retail Market Development



(ORMD) at www.icc.illinois.gov/ORMD.

Q. How can municipalities help their residents protect themselves?

A. Municipalities should tell residents about ways they can protect themselves:

- ComEd is supplier indifferent and supports a customer's right to choose.
- ComEd does NOT endorse and does NOT work with any telemarketer or door-to-door sales people NOR market its supplier service.
- If a ComEd employee contacts a customer at their residence/business, they will have a ComEd-issued employee ID and will have it visible. Customers must always use caution when letting salespeople into their homes. If they feel unsafe, they should ask the person to leave or contact the authorities.

Residents interested in switching to an alternative supplier can view a list of available alternative provider offers on the Citizens Utility Board website located at www.citizensutilityboard.org/ciElectric_cubfacts_alternativesuppliers.html.

- They must use caution when giving their ComEd account information – it can be used to switch their account to an alternative supplier.
- They must document the salesperson's contact information, which will NOT include any ComEd information, before sharing any personal or billing information
- They must be sure to clearly understand the service they agree to – being sure to read or listen to any recording affirming their selection of supply service by the salesperson.

Once a customer has been switched, ComEd will mail a letter to the customer's mailing address to notify them of the supply switch. If they did not authorize the switch, they should immediately contact the supplier listed on the letter to have the switch rescinded and/ or contact ICC Consumer Services Division immediately.

Later that same week, Leo Club visited the South Suburban Humane Society to walk dogs and play with cats. "It was another good outing for the group," Klein said.


Mother McAuley National Honor Society Inductees



Walker Park's fieldhouse recently enjoyed a facelift of its first floor with a new brick veneer constructed through the volunteer work of local bricklayer apprentices and trainers.

Three third-year apprentices - Michael Gall, Jessica Orellana and Javier Velasquez - further developed their craftsmanship under the direction of Dave Wysocki, regional safety and training director, and Dave Naprstek, brick instructor, of the International Union of Bricklayers and Allied Craftworkers' District Council Training Center in Addison, IL. 
He said the Center actively looks for community projects for their third-year apprentices, who do about two or three such projects each year.

He competes in about four marathons each year and has coached cross country at St. Xavier University for two years and Tinley Park High School for seven years. Bareikis runs near and far from home. He trains at home but tries to go to Kenya every year for training as well. "[Crestwood] is a safe, nice community for runners. It'd be nice if there were more," he said.
