Another Chance for Crestwood's Own ZIP Code

The Village of Crestwood has a second chance to acquire its own ZIP code. This opportunity arose, according to the Village Trustees, because an investigation by the U.S.P.S. Inspector General found that the standard used to determine Crestwood's ZIP code qualification was not in accordance with standard procedure. As such, the U.S. Post Office has graciously agreed to allow residents of our village to once again opt for having its own ZIP code. The post office will be mailing surveys out to residents beginning on April 15th and those surveys must be completed and returned by April 30th. Every household and business owner in Crestwood is eligible to fill out the survey — and everyone should.

Every household and business in Crestwood stands to gain significantly from the Village having its own ZIP code. Crestwood does not charge tax for many things like cell phone services, but because we use the same ZIP code as Midlothian — which does charge these taxes — our cell carriers automatically charge those taxes on our bills. Our own ZIP code will mean significant savings to everyone in our village and will eliminate the confusion we all experience when filling out forms online that automatically default to "Midlothian" when we enter our current ZIP code.

A Town Hall meeting will be held April 20th at 7:00pm at the Crestwood Civic Center (14025 South Kostner Ave., Crestwood) to discuss our own ZIP code and to answer any questions you may have. Residents are also encouraged to call the Village Hall with any questions they may have regarding the ZIP code survey. The Village is currently seeking volunteers to go door to door in Crestwood to alert every resident and business of the importance of filling out the survey and posting it. Those interested in doing so should contact the Village Hall and sign up to volunteer.

Renters in Crestwood should note that they are also eligible to complete the survey and mail it back to the post office. Please don't throw your survey away! Having our own ZIP code is something most everyone in our Village has sought for many years, so we ask everyone most earnestly to complete the survey and return it to the post office. No stamp is necessary — just fill out the survey and drop it in the post

State No Longer Issuing Emissions, Plate Renewal Notifications



Illinois motorists are hereby advised that the state will no longer send notifications for required vehicle emissions tests or for vehicle license plate renewal stickers. The changes were necessitated by the state's budget impasse. (By not sending out the renewal notices alone, the state saves \$450,000/month.) The responsibility of tracking emissions tests and timely registration of vehicles is now squarely on the shoulders of Illinois motorists.

Illinois Secretary of State Jesse White has decided to temporarily allow vehicle owners who haven't taken the emissions test to acquire their renewal stickers, citing the unfair burden suddenly placed on Illinois motorists. Those vehicle owners will be informed that they still have to get their vehicles tested for emissions. This is, however, a temporary suspension and is subject to change.

David Drucker, a press secretary for the state of Illinois, recently stated: "We at the Secretary of State's office are sorry for any inconvenience. ... We are no longer sending the notices, but we still are able to mail the stickers back to you following these guidelines: Copy your previous registration card —

which should always be in your vehicle — and send with a check to: Office of the Secretary of State, VEHICLE SERVICES DEPARTMENT, Howlett Building, 501 S. 2nd Street, #312, Springfield, IL 62756. Please allow enough time — two to three weeks — in order to remain in compliance."

Alternately, you can register your vehicle plate renewal as follows:

- **In Person:** Bring your license plate number to any secretary of state renewal location and have your renewal processed on-site. (Renewal is permissible at any time of year.)
- **Online:** Online renewal is available through

Dear Crestwood Residents:

In its effort to improve public and driver safety throughout the community, the Village of Crestwood, after careful consideration and detailed analysis, has decided to move forward with a new and cutting-edge photo-enforcement program, more commonly known as a "Red Light Camera" program. Although this initiative is new for the Village, it has operated throughout the United States and globally for decades. In fact, it has been shown to save lives all over the world. The Village is confident that implementation of this type of program will reduce possible fatalities and severe personal injury due to driver carelessness and/or reckless disregard for the law right here in Crestwood.

As your Chief of Police, I want to advise you that over the course of the next few weeks, cameras will be installed at the intersections of Midlothian Turnpike and Cicero Avenue (Northbound and Southbound), 135th and Cicero Avenue (Northbound, Southbound, and Westbound), and Cal Sag Road and Cicero Avenue (Westbound, Northbound, and Southbound). These intersections were chosen because of the high number of traffic incidents in

those areas. In 2013, there were 67 crashes, 16 of which involved personal injury and in 2014, we saw 64 crashes, seven of which involved personal injury. We know that by taking this precaution, we will reduce the number of vehicle collisions while increasing driver and pedestrian safety. Even one crash is one too many.

As this project gets closer to being operational, we will provide more information to the residents. I encourage you to Choose Safety. Stop On Red.

Dear Friends and Neighbors,

I would like to address several important topics that will affect all of us here in our village. As you know, when I first asked for your support for my candidacy as Mayor, I promised that I would work to restore confidence in the administration of our village. I also promised that I would work to ensure that our village government becomes fully transparent in all of its activities and that never again would the people of Crestwood be left in the dark as to what their elected officials are planning or doing.

To honor my promise, we successfully instituted a number of changes including:

- The development of an official village website that informs every citizen of the time and location of meetings, the agenda for each meeting and subsequent minutes that are transcribed in every meeting.
- Public disclosure of all Village financials including the Annual Financial Report, Annual Treasurer's Report, Annual Appropriations Ordinance, Annual Budget Ordinance and all Monthly Village Warrants. All are available at the Village website.
- Time and place of all Committee meetings posted at the Village website
- Transfer of the official Village newspaper, the Crestwood Adviser, to independent oversight and administration by a private, local firm.
- Entering into a voluntary agreement with the Cook County Sheriff's Office to act as Inspector General to independently investigate any allegation of wrongdoing on the part of Village workers and elected officials.

I am very proud of all these changes and the fact that Crestwood is now recognized as having one of the most transparent governments in Illinois. In part, as a result of these changes, I was recently informed that the Illinois State Crime Commission has selected me to be named "Mayor of the Year" for 2016 and Crestwood Police Chief, David Weigand has been named "Police Chief of the Year." This is the first time in the history of that organization that a Mayor and Police Chief from the same municipality have been awarded such prestigious honors in the same year. While this honor is being bestowed upon me as your Mayor, I share it with all of the Trustees you wisely elected, who supported each of these initiatives. Administering to a vibrant and growing community like Crestwood requires a team of dedicated people willing to work together to bring

about real and meaningful change. Thanks to you, Crestwood now has the best government in Illinois.


While all of these changes are considered by many to be remarkable, I feel there is still more that can be done to ensure that our village will always have the best leadership available. That is why I am now proposing that we adopt term limitations on all the elected officials in our village. I intend to ask our board to approve placing a referendum on the November 2016 ballot that will limit every elected official of our village to a maximum of three consecutive terms in any village office. I hope you will agree with me in my belief that fresh ideas and enthusiasm are essential ingredients in fostering great government. Too often we see recalcitrant leadership leading to stagnation. We see it in government, in business and even in our sporting clubs and leagues. I believe public service means you come to office, serve the people to the best of your ability and then make room for young men and women with new ideas and fresh zeal to take your place.

I also am proposing that we strengthen our relationship with the Cook County Sheriff's office of the Inspector General. We recently approved the renewal of that agreement and I am proposing that we strengthen this agreement by passing an ordinance that bans any elected official or Village employee from holding office or employment with the Village if they fail to cooperate in any investigation undertaken by the Inspector General's office. I feel it is essential that there be consequences borne by anyone who feels they can ignore questions when it comes to allegations of betraying the public trust.

I hope you will agree with me that these two new initiatives will help to solidify a government here in Crestwood that will always be of, by, and for the people of this village, and never for a favored few or powerful interests. With your support and that of your elected Trustees, we will build a foundation for government in Crestwood that repels corruption and fosters an environment favoring honest and trustworthy administration for all of the people all of the time.

Although there is no cost for a permit, a permit is required. Permits are available at the Village Hall during normal business hours.



We Watch, We Call!

Mayor Presta and the Board of Trustees have heard the requests of many to report crimes in our Village. Working with our Police Department, a compiled snapshot of a month's reporting will be shown here in the Adviser. Our intent is to inform the public in order to protect and be vigilant in calling upon our Police. The Mayor urges all to stay tuned in to your neighbors' well-being and property. Deceptive Practice

2-1-2016: A victim reported that he received a phone call about his grandson being arrested and needing to post bail. The victim then was advised that he could post bail by using iTunes gift cards. The victim purchased \$2,000 worth of gift cards at a local store. He called the number back and provided the card information before realizing that he was being scammed.

2-1-2016: A resident was contacted numerous times about a payday loan that he had never applied for. No personal information was provided.

**Residents Acknowledge Crestwood
Fire Dept.'s Bravery, Teamwork**

Crestwood not only has first-rate firefighters, but it has citizens who appreciate what they do. When a fire in one of the units at the Sandpiper condominium complex required the services of the Crestwood Fire Department, the firefighters who responded did so quickly and professionally, but left an especially courteous impression on Sandpiper resident Judy Lehiy.

According to Lehiy, the firemen not only evacuated the residents and made sure that they were kept warm, but they listened attentively to the temporarily displaced residents' concerns for valuables and patiently retrieved them as requested. In one instance, the owner of a water-damaged unit in the complex had to have her cat extricated, which the firefighters did with delight. Ultimately, no one was hurt in the fire.

When Lehiy approached one of the firefighters to thank him for his efforts, professionalism and humanity, she asked his name to publicly acknowledge him. She was surprised by his answer. "He said, 'No, don't single me out — it was a team effort,'" she recalls. "I just thought it was refreshing, and that other people would like to know how nice our firefighters are."

Shepard Cancer Survivor Honored With Couture Dress for Prom



It sounds like a modern fairy tale.

When Alan B. Shepard High School Student Jasmine Taylor was diagnosed with leukemia, she couldn't have known how hard the road ahead would be. But she also couldn't have known how people would rally around her in her darkest hours — nor that in time, her leukemia would go into remission and she would find herself going to prom in a couture gown designed by dress designer Mark Roscoe.



"It was very scary," Taylor recently told *The Daily Southtown* of her diagnosis in the days leading up to the start of her sophomore year. "The hardest thing you can ever imagine going through."

Through emergency surgery, chemotherapy via Hope Children's Hospital in Oak Lawn, hair loss and unabated fear, Taylor endured, missing many days at school and requiring home tutoring. But the day came for her final bout of chemo, and it seemed an occasion worth celebrating. Donna Hughes, Taylor's Art teacher at Shepard, on hearing of her fashion-forward student's final treatment, decided to do something special.

"After seeing a compelling segment on WGN about an attorney/fashion designer named Mark Roscoe, I e-mailed him on the chance that he could design a prom dress for our senior art student Jasmine Taylor." Roscoe, whose dresses have been featured at the Academy Awards, Emmy Awards and Grammy Awards, regularly designs dresses for survivors, in memory of his mother who lost her own battle to cancer. He offered to make a gown for Taylor at no cost. (The lacy gown's estimated value is between \$3,500-\$5,000.)

"Jasmine was such a delight to meet," Roscoe told *The Daily Southtown*. "Our hearts went out to her for what she's been going through. And this is just in line with what we've been doing."

The dress has been described as a crepe-back satin under an Italian lace, featuring a keyhole back and hand-bound seams. According to Roscoe, it took about 90 hours to complete, from design and fabric selection to fittings and production.

On March 15th, Taylor debuted the dress at the Glitz & Glamour Fashion Show benefiting A Silver Lining Foundation at Chicago's Peninsula Hotel. But the big event will be wearing the dress to her own prom Friday, April 29th, with her boyfriend, Lorenzo Lashley. "I'm very excited," Taylor said.

And that's just as it should be, thanks to the good people at Hope Children's Hospital, Taylor's family, a caring designer and a highly thoughtful Art teacher at Shepard.

Local Students Graduate from Fermilab Physics Program



On Saturday, March 5th, Marist High School students and Incarnation Alumni John Kruse and Christian Cunningham graduated from Fermi National Accelerator Laboratory's (Fermilab) Saturday Morning Physics (SMP) program.

A series of nine lectures aimed at high school students to encourage a lifelong love of science, the SMP program caters to very dedicated students who use their Saturdays to come and study physics. The program does not require any prior knowledge of the topics, though having high school level physics instruction prior to participating is certainly helpful to understanding the talks. Led by Fermilab physicists and scientists, the topics vary weekly. The initial lecture focuses on an introduction to particle physics. In the weeks that follow, subjects range from the theory of relativity and quantum mechanics to a discussion of accelerators, detectors, and neutrinos, the most ghostly of all subatomic particles that may hold the key to the birth of the universe. Fermilab has a large variety of interesting sites, many of them in which important scientific discoveries have been made, and each lecture is followed by a site tour to one of the various locations for a closer look at physics in action.





Forest Preserves of Cook County Prepares for Spring Trout Fishing Season

The Forest Preserves of Cook County is pleased to announce that the 2016 spring inland trout fishing season at Axehead Lake (Park Ridge), Belleau Lake (Park Ridge), Sag Quarry East (Lemont) and Green Lake (Calumet City) is open as of April 2nd, 2016.

The Forest Preserves will be purchasing and stocking approximately 500 pounds of rainbow trout for Sag Quarry East; 1,250 pounds for Axehead Lake; and 1,250 pounds for Belleau Lake; while the Illinois Department of Natural Resources will be purchasing and stocking 700 pounds for Green Lake. These are catchable sized rainbow trout, in the 1/2 -1 lb. size range.

The Forest Preserves trout lakes will be closed to all fishing from Monday, March 28th, until sunrise on Saturday, April 2nd. The lake closings allow the trout to disperse throughout the lakes prior to opening. As part of the IDNR's stocking program, fishing for and possession of any trout is illegal from March 15th until 5:00am on April 2nd.

Once the season opens, there is a five trout per day creel limit with no size restrictions. No more than two lines per person with no more than two hooks per line may be used.

A valid Illinois sport fishing license with an Inland Trout Stamp is required for anglers 16 years of age and older. An Illinois sport fishing license is not required for Illinois residents who are disabled and have a State of Illinois disabled I.D. card showing a Class 2 or 2A disability or a Veterans Disability Card, and Illinois residents who are on active military duty and are home on leave.

For a list of all of the lakes and waters open to public fishing within the Forest Preserves, visit fpdcc.com/recreation/fishing and download our Fishing Guide. The guide includes maps that show the location and depths of each lake, and list principal fish species.

O'Brien Water Reclamation Plant to Bring Disinfection Online

The Metropolitan Water Reclamation District's (MWRD) O'Brien Water Reclamation Plant (WRP) will introduce ultraviolet radiation to disinfect water as part of a final layer to its treatment process. A ribbon-cutting ceremony will take place on Wednesday, March 23rd, at 10:00am. The O'Brien WRP is located at 3500 Howard Street, Skokie.

The O'Brien WRP serves more than 1.3 million people within 143 square miles. Upon completion, the UV disinfection system is now the largest water treatment UV installation in the world, having the potential to treat 450 million gallons of water per day, using 896 lamps that provide low-pressure, high-output performance. The disinfection technologies neutralize or kill bacteria and microorganisms in treated water and reduce the risk of health problems resulting from direct contact with the water while swimming or recreating on a waterway. Between last year's disinfection upgrades implemented at Calumet WRP, the MWRD now has a system in place that will dramatically improve the quality of water throughout the Chicago Area Waterway System, while protecting the region's drinking water supply in Lake Michigan.

Disinfection occurs after wastewater passes through a series of treatment processes, including screening, filtering, settling and microbial aeration. In addition to directly benefiting the water environment, the disinfection project put hundreds of tradespeople to work.

through www.CyberDriveIllinois.com. Be sure to allow adequate time for the sticker to be mailed back to you for ensured compliance.

Emissions test tracking is a bit more difficult to track, but here are some rules of thumb to help you remember, and resources to rely on:

- Vehicles are typically tested every other year, so if your vehicle is a 2012, for example, you will need to bring it for emissions testing during even years. If it's a 2011, you will need to bring it for testing in odd years.
- You can also phone the local office of EPA Emission Testing at (847) 758-3400 or by visiting www.ilsos.gov/regstatus for information on your vehicle's testing due date.

Come Out for Befriend EB Butterfly Bash 2016



Smoking & Home Fire Safety



The place where we feel safest — at home — is where most smoking-materials structure fires, deaths, and injuries occur. Smoking materials are the leading cause of fire deaths. Smoking material fires are preventable.

Smoking Safety

- » If you smoke, use only fire-safe cigarettes.
- » If you smoke, smoke outside. Most deaths result from fires that started in living rooms, family rooms and dens or in bedrooms.
- » Keep cigarettes, lighters, matches, and other smoking materials up high out of the reach of children, in a locked cabinet.

Put It Out!

- » Use a deep, sturdy ashtray. Place it away from anything that can burn.
- » Do not discard cigarettes in vegetation such as mulch, potted plants or landscaping, peat moss, dried grasses, leaves or other things that could ignite easily.
- » Before you throw away butts and ashes, make sure they are out, and dousing in water or sand is the best way to do that.

Smoking and Medical Oxygen

Never smoke and never allow anyone to smoke where medical oxygen is used. Medical oxygen can cause materials to ignite more easily and make fires burn at a faster rate than normal. It can make an existing fire burn faster and hotter.

— Be Alert! —

- To prevent a deadly cigarette fire, you must be alert. You won't be alert if you are sleepy, have taken medicine or drugs that make you drowsy or have consumed alcohol.
- Never smoke in bed.

FACTS

- ❗ The risk of dying in a home structure fire caused by smoking materials rises with age.
- ❗ One out of four fatal victims of smoking-material fires is not the smoker whose cigarette started the fire.

9-volt Battery Safety

9-volt batteries power our smoke alarms, household items and toys. They can be found in most homes. But these batteries can be a fire hazard if not stored safely or disposed of with care.



The problem

- » 9-volt batteries can be dangerous. The positive and negative posts are close together. If a metal object touches the two posts of a 9-volt battery, it can cause a short circuit. This can make enough heat to start a fire.
- » It is unsafe to store 9-volt batteries in a drawer near paper clips, coins, pens, or other batteries. Do not store common household items such as steel wool, aluminum foil, and keys near 9-volt batteries. If these items touch the two posts, there is a greater risk of a fire starting.
- » Weak batteries may have enough charge to cause a fire. Some fires have started in trash when 9-volt batteries were thrown away with other metal items.

Storing 9-volt batteries

- » Keep batteries in original packaging until you are ready to use them. If loose, keep the posts covered with masking, duct, or electrical tape. Prevent the posts from coming in contact with metal objects.
- » Keep them someplace safe where they won't be tossed around.
- » Store batteries standing up.
- » 9-volt batteries should not be stored loose in a drawer. Do not store them in containers with other batteries.

Disposal

- » 9-volt batteries should not be thrown away with trash. They can come in contact with other batteries or pieces of metal.
- » 9-volt batteries can be taken to a collection site for household hazardous waste.
- » To be safe, cover the positive and negative posts with masking, duct, or electrical tape before getting rid of batteries.
- » Some states do not allow any type of battery to be disposed of with trash. Check with your city or town for the best way to get rid of batteries.

Crestwood History: Did You Know?

- On Sept. 26th, 1928, by a vote of 71 to 12, residents of the section north of Midlothian bounded by 135th Street on the north, 143rd Street on the south, Claire Boulevard on the east and Cicero Avenue on the west decided to incorporate under the name of Crestwood.
- At the time of the Village's founding, about 400 people resided in the area.
- Names for the Village were submitted by residents, and through process of elimination, narrowed down to Crestwood and Allenwood. A vote was taken and the name Crestwood was chosen.
- The Village's first government elections were held Nov. 15th, 1928. William H. Walker won the mayoral seat by a landslide, with William P. Kuntz winning for Police Magistrate and Steward Turner for Police Chief.
